and therefore I have hope:

- ²² Because of the LORD's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. ²³ They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.
- ²⁴ I say to myself, "The LORD is my portion; therefore I will wait for him."
- ²⁶The LORD is good to those whose hope is in him, to the one who seeks him; ²⁶ it is good to wait quietly for the salvation of the LORD.
- c. Some Key Responses
 - i. There is no need to wait quietly per se.
 - 1. Revolutionary Patience (West, 1985)
 - 2. Active Resistance (in the meanwhile)
 - ii. God's faithfulness includes punishing wickedness.
 - iii. If one has hope in God and God's justice, then there would be no counterclaim that God should not have allowed the wickedness of people to lead to their own ruin.
