# Session 4: November 17, 2019 (Daniel)

### 1. Criticism

- a. Author
  - i. Multiple authors; attributed to Daniel ("God is my judge")
  - ii. Considered "fictional" in the sense that it is a crafted set of narratives instead of oracles
  - iii. Written in Aramaic, Hebrew, (and Greek)
  - iv. The text's date is not settled; often considered Deuteronomical (with some of its sections deemed Deuterocanonical)

# b. Audience

- i. [Old View] The faithful in captivity during the Babylonian exile
- ii. [Newer View] Reestablished Jews after the building of the Second Temple.
- iii. [Christian Symbolic] Christians wanting a description of the end times
- c. Style (cf. Collins, Daniel, with an Introduction to Apocalyptic Literature, Eerdmans 1984)
  - i. Legend [Daniel 1-6]
  - ii. Historical Apocalypse [Daniel 7-12]
    - 1. Ex eventu prophecy: prophesies events that have already happened
      - a. Periodization of history
      - b. Regnal prophecy: "predictions" of the rise and fall of nations and rulers
    - 2. Eschatological predictions
      - a. Signs of the End Times
      - b. Description of Judgment Scenes
      - c. Epiphany of a Heavenly Figure
    - 3. VERSUS Otherworldly Journey Apocalypse (cf. Revelation next time)
  - iii. Interpretation of Symbolic Dreams (throughout)
  - iv. Numerology

### d. Messages

- i. God is sovereign over the kingdoms of Earth (even if it doesn't feel that way).
- ii. God's Kingdom will survive and overthrow all earthly kingdoms.
- iii. Remain faithful to God; do not partake in pagan religious rituals.
- e. Interpretive Frameworks
  - i. Literal: The text describes the historical situation of the author, with an expression of hope about the immanent future pertaining to that situation.
  - ii. (Christian) Symbolic: OT prophecy foretells of Jesus the Messiah.
  - iii. Dispensationalist: The text blends both the Literal and Symbolic framework.
  - iv. Apocalyptic: The text describes the end of the world, freed from the concrete historical particulars within which the text is written.
